Nature Notes

I checked last year's notes and the weather had been very wet from mid July. This year, one group of people state that we are feeling the effects of Global Warning, whilst others say it is just unusual weather like that seen in 1976. Whatever it is, I found it unpleasant, and spent a lot of the time in the shade as the temperature reached 31 degrees in the sun on the patio.

The grass cutters were round yesterday attacking the areas that were grass in the past! I suppose they have to cut at certain times, but it always seems odd, as there isn't that much grass on the sides, unlike Tollhouse Meadow. Would it cost too much to have smaller motor machines that made a better job, especially as I have seen two of the giant sit-upon lawn mowers going over the same small patch?

It was interesting watching the different bees on a variety of flowers. as some can only visit open daisies or mallows, whilst others manage trumpet-like flowers such as salvias. I purchased more flowering plants when the earlier ones succumbed to the heat, although the self-seeded Linaria had another flowering. This plant has proved useful as all the bees like it and now a small blue butterfly was seen today. I shall sow as many of those seeds as I can for next year. By watering and deadheading the twelve buddleias (also called buddlejas) in pots, I have managed to keep them in flower until it's time for the later butterflies.

Marian has seen a blue butterfly but I think it was larger than mine with brown underneath, whilst this one was turquoise. I might attempt to photograph it tomorrow.

It is horrifying to hear of yet another tree disease entering the UK. This is called *Xytella* (see https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Xylella_fastidiosa for more information) and will destroy even more trees. DEFRA have asked people not to bring back plants from abroad.

The hedgehog population that I have seen on one night was two at the back with three at the front when I opened the door, although I think more may be arriving later in the night, as all the food has disappeared by morning. I don't think foxes are eating it. The "poo" is small!

BMAF 2019

A Flabby Tabby, a Sat Nav with a mind of its own, Dementia, a letter to Donald Trump, the excitement of Christmas Eve, 'I Hate Vegetables' and a short story called 'The Generation Game' all have one thing in common. They were category winners in the 2018 Basingstoke Music and Art Festival's (BMAF) Creative Writing Competition.

The 57th running of the annual writing competition launches in September with an entry closing date of Monday 10th December. Cups and trophies will be awarded to the winners at the Awards Ceremony on Sunday 17th March 2019 at Queen Mary's College. The competition is open to children (School Years 1 to 13) and adults alike. As well as the usual creative writing categories of Letters, Articles, Short Stories, Script Writing, Poetry and Sonnets, the 2019 syllabus sees the introduction of a new 'Flash Fiction' 500 words category. Flash Fiction is a relatively new form of writing and is perhaps best personified by the highly successful, Chris Evans inspired, BBC Radio Two 500 word writing challenge for children.

Launched in collaboration with Destination Basingstoke, the new category is open to adults as well as children. Entrants will need to produce an original 500 word fictional story. The added challenge, unique to the BMAF event, is that it should have a Basingstoke (or North Hampshire) setting. However, the real challenge in a work of such extreme brevity will be to ensure completeness in respect of both character and plot development and within the 500 words, to hint at a much larger back story.

Entries for all categories are welcomed

from writers and budding authors irrespective of where they live within the United Kingdom. The Creative Writing competition is no exception and unique in that ALL entrants receive adjudicator feedback as well as a personally signed certificate.

On 8 July I attended Great Binfields Primary school celebration of their New Build. The new extension has provided new classrooms consisting of a music and drama room, offices, and support spaces, doubling the number of pupil places from 210 to 420. The new County Council Assisted Living Scheme on Great Binfields Road is nearing completion. Only the landscaping of the grounds are left to finish. Our weather thus far has prompted a different growing pattern for our grasses and hedgerows and I have noticed that our usual problem in Chineham of overgrowing of footpaths in particular is evident. Your Parish Council and Borough Councillors will, as always, contact the BDBC Landscape team when we either observe or are alerted to excessive overgrowth. However, if any residents live with a boundary adjacent to these affected footpaths and are able to trim the worst or the growth back, it would assist the most vulnerable to these obstructions, and I am thinking of the more elderly and those with pushchairs especially, who have difficulty passing some hedgerows.

Those of us that were affected by the illegal invasion of travellers on to the Pettys Brook area some months ago, may be heartened by the following: 'Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council and Hampshire County Council have been granted an interim injunction from the High Court banning the setting up of unauthorised encampments in a large section of the borough. Basingstoke and Deane has become the first in the county and one of few nationally to be granted the interim injunction preventing unauthorised encampments being set up or items fly-tipped within an allocated boundary covering the urbanised area of Basingstoke town, as well as the outlying areas of Bramley and Silchester and a small parcel of land at Stratfield Turgis.'

Linguatastic

International Translation Dav is celebrated on 30th September and so in recognition of this day, we would like to share with you a few interesting translation-related anecdotes. As some readers may have read in The Independent, there was reason for embarrassment a few weeks ago when the British government "botched an attempt to translate its Brexit white paper into other languages". Native speakers of these languages reported basic errors including the misspelling of Estonia and Finland in the Estonian and Finnish versions, unusual French inflections which presented Brexit as a moral good and the German version being branded "unreadable" because of the "archaic and needlessly complex" language used. One can read more on this cringe-worthy episode on The Independent's website or listen to quite an amusing Radio 4 snippet which Linguatastic has published on its Facebook page, but in the meantime, here are some other examples of where translation has gone awry:

- On the door of a Moscow hotel room: If this is your first visit to the USSR, you are welcome to it.
- In a Copenhagen airline ticket office: We take your bags and send them in all directions.
- In a Budapest zoo: Please do not feed the animals. If you have any suitable food, give it to the guard on duty.
- In a Japanese information booklet about using the hotel air conditioner: If you want just condition of warm in your room, please control yourself.
- In an East African newspaper: A new swimming pool is rapidly taking shape since the contractors have thrown in the bulk of their workers.

Of course, the above quotes can generally be understood, but what they do perhaps illustrate is that translation is not necessarily a case of 1+1=2, but it requires a true understanding of two languages and a skill which deserves our utmost respect.

Minister's Letter

Watch out: there's a new Vicar about...let me introduce myself. My name is Jonathan Clark, and I've just moved into Chineham with my wife Martha, to be the Lead Minister at Christ Church. Already in the few weeks we've been here, we've felt very welcomed, and are beginning to get involved in all that Chineham has to offer.

We recently re-watched the film Spectre, seeing what trouble James Bond could get into and out of this time. I won't spoil the plot, but in common with his other performances as Bond, Daniel Craig hardly ever looks like he's enjoying himself. Which is a shame, as surely saving the world should be at least a wee bit of fun? Perhaps after 24 filmed escapades over 50 years, Bond needs a new role?

I've been fortunate in having a change of career. For nearly 20 years I was happily working as a programmer and later systems engineer in the intelligence community. I expected to be doing that the rest of my working days, but God had other ideas. He called me away from that and into this new vocation to be a shepherd to God's people and to spread His good news in this generation. Starting a new role or job is something we look forward to, and we bring fresh energy to it. What if in the next Bond movie, 007 could be consciously honouring God as he defeats terrorism? Perhaps then he would smile a little, or even have some job satisfaction? Fanciful perhaps, but I for one would enjoy it more.

We both look forward to getting to know lots of you in the village, and sharing in the highs and lows of life together. We live at 1 Hartswood, and you'll sooner or later see us out and about jogging or walking dogs.

The North Hampshire Downs Ramblers group is part of the Ramblers Association. We walk mostly in Hampshire and the surrounding countryside. In the last few months our group has enjoyed both walks and social activities, including our regular away trip and summer picnic.

The group walk on both Tuesday, Saturday and have just recently started a Thursday walk which is sometimes a bit shorter for those who do not want to walk the longer distances. In the summer this can take the form of a short evening walk and pub stop. The walks cover areas in and around Basingstoke as well as sometimes going further afield. We have had some lovely spring and summer walks, enjoying the changing landscapes and of course trying to avoid the worst of the hot weather.

On our Tuesday morning walks, which are typically 6-7 miles, we continue to attract many walkers. News from the Beat

Hello Chineham, I am glad to be writing to you again for the second time running. As discussed last time I am hoping to continue this after a recent 'dry-spell'.

I am glad to report that the low crime trend is continuing, in the last month we have had 91 reports – 28 of which were recorded crime. The other 63 were information messages, risk management reports, missing persons or anti-social behaviour (which is also low at the moment). With the summer holidays here there are more people out and about during the day, but also more people on holiday and the general mood in Chineham seems to be one of general relaxation! Please let me know though if I am wrong.

As such there isn't a great deal to report, as usual though the 'issue of the day' is vehicle crime. However since the last Chineham Chat Basingstoke Police are glad to say that a man has been arrested and remanded in custody! I love watching Police Interceptors, but they can often paint an unrealistic image of policing powers. Getting a suspect remanded is difficult, so good work to all officers involved especially PC Brindley. Please continue to be vigilant. As an extra, Hampshire Police are conducting a county-wide campaign to utilise the community to help detect and prevent domestic incidents. If you hear or see anything which you believe may be domestic related please call the Police immediately.

Other issues on the beat including the use of the Chineham 'MUGA' near Tesco's. Unfortunately most of the issues happen outside of the working hours of Neighbourhood Policing and

therefore it can be difficult to get a response. Please do continue to call 101 though no matter what time and an officer will attend if possible. We have many partners too including the council that will need to know what is happening so they can put strategies into place to help problem solve ongoing issues.

In relation to ongoing partnership working, the Community Speedwatch Volunteers will be out in force again. They do a fantastic job in helping to keep the roads safe. PCSO Green has supported this by proactively dealing with driving offenders including a male who had an unrestrained young child in the front seat of his vehicle and two young woman on who were driving while using their mobile phone. It amazes us how people still fail to understand the risks of such activity! Speedwatch is one of our longestpartnership working and both PCSOs on the beat spend an equal time with all schemes across the whole beat area (which includes Old Basing and Lychpit). Both PCSOs spend much more time on their bikes in the Chineham area than most other staff and therefore consider to be in the privileged position to engage more with the community and its volunteers. If you wish to discuss anything with us or have any questions, you will likely find us around on the beat or, failing that, you can email us and we will get back to you ASAP.

We are 'The Bootleg Shadows', one of the UK's premiere 60s tribute bands. The Bootleg Shadows have been entertaining audiences in theatres around the UK with their celebration of the great music of The Shadows and Cliff Richard for over 10 years. You can expect to hear all of the hits, from Apache in 1960 up to Riders in the Sky in 1980 and everything in between! We also sometimes throw in a few 'wild cards' so you may hear some Beatles or some Duane Eddy or The Tornados' Telstar or even Fleetwood Mac's Albatross.

Firstly, above all, expect a really great night out. The concert is really a show, which of course encompasses the fantastic music of The Shadows and Cliff, but also contains a lot of laughs along the way - audiences always leave with big smiles on their faces. Secondly, the attention to detail in performing the music is second to none. Period correct instruments and amplifiers are used to re-create that great sound of the 60s coupled with the 'look' of the Shadows and their trademark synchronized dance steps. to create a spectacular show for all fans of 60s music to enjoy. We do not attempt to be look-alikes per se, but we are sound-alikes and the feedback we get from our audiences is fantastic.

The band have met with the 'real' Shadows on a number of occasions, including headlining at the International Cliff and the Shadows convention in Holland in front of Bruce Welch & Brian 'Licorice' Locking!
