March sees the start of a new venture in some of the libraries in our area: the 'Discussing Dyslexia' series of talks. These cover a range of aspects of dyslexia, from secondary school challenges to giving confidence and coping strategies. There will be five talks from the 2nd March to the 11th May, with each session costing £4 to attend, or there is an offer of £15 to attend all five. Nature Notes

The first signs of spring are later this year. Even the snowdrops, sheltered under the large holly bush, took for ages to appear and are only now just in bud. The winter aconites beat them into flowering. In case you don't know this delight, it has a large yellow buttercup-shaped flower, surrounded by a green frill.

Whilst standing in that area I noticed that all the berries had been stripped from the holly. There are always rustlings emanating from that direction, so, it could have been any of the blackbirds, wood pigeons or starlings that I see frequently. I have counted five blackbirds at one time, with four cocks scrapping. There is one blackbird that enjoys splashing in the large dish of water, regardless of any other birds. Today, I watched as a collared dove sat on the rim drinking daintily, ignoring all the frantic washing taking place at the other end. I think it may be the same blackbird who fastidiously removed one leaf at a time before his ablutions, last year. Thankfully, I do not now have to pour boiling water over the ice

The squirrel has returned a number of times to raid the bird feeders. It is not content to climb down to eat nuts on the ground, but hangs from branches. I spotted it standing on a medium sized branch in the evergreen Elaeagnus eating a nut. It then stretched back to the hanger, selected a nut, balanced back to consume it, and continued until it had eaten its fill. I know squirrels are really rats with furry tails, but they are cute in this part of the country, where the red ones do not need our protection. I hope it doesn't end up squashed crossing to the main wood.

The catkins on the hazel trees on Thornhill Way are swinging in the breeze. Hopefully, the gales have finished, so they will dance

for a few more weeks. I must visit Tollhouse Meadow to check on the alder catkins and see if any frogspawn has been laid in the pond. Please inform me if you see any. The frogs in my small pond have not yet appeared so I must replace the shallow dish in which they always like to lay their frogspawn.

Smear Test Attendance Urged

Our GP Practices want to enlighten women about the importance of attending their smear test. You may think it's not a great topic to highlight here, but it could save lives. With better treatment, the Cervical Screening Programme and the availability of HPV vaccines (the anti-cervical cancer vaccination for young girls), the survival and prevention of cervical cancer has improved dramatically in the last decade. However, a staggering number of women are being diagnosed with cervical cancer every day and sadly three will also lose their battle against it.

One of the biggest reasons for this is not attending the screening programme (commonly known as the smear test) when invited. This picks up changes in the cells of the cervix before cancer has developed. All women aged 25-49 receive an invite to attend every three years, and those aged 50-64 every five years. Despite this, many young women are not attending their smear tests. GPs are encouraging all women to get a test booked as soon as you receive the invite.

GP and cancer specialist Dr. Charlotte Hutchings said: 'Cervical screening prevents around 5000 cases of cervical cancer every year in the UK. It is a concern that the test in younger women is decreasing in North Hampshire. We need to educate women about the test sensitively so they can make an informed decision about whether to have the test. Screening is an important part of the fight for better cancer survival in the UK.' News from the Beat

I am very happy to report there is currently little to make you aware by the way of crime. As of this month, there are no criminal issues in the local area ongoing. That said, there have been a few sporadic incidents of burglary which would seem to be linked to a number of similar offences reported elsewhere in Basingstoke. The offenders in these burglaries seem to look for houses with insecurities such as doors that have not been double-locked, those left unlocked at night or with open/unlocked windows. As such, I am urging all residents to ensure all their properties are as secure as possible, with all doors and windows locked in order to deter any opportunistic criminals.

We have also had a high number of reports of tools being stolen from vehicles all over the town of Basingstoke. Many of these thefts occurred with no visible damage to the vehicles themselves, showing no signs of forced entry. There is a possibility that owners have left their vehicles unlocked. In an effort to discover the number of insecure vans, myself and my colleague carried out numerous checks in the Chineham area. finding about 1 in 10 were left unlocked (information packs were left inside for the driver). This is therefore an appeal to all residents who own or park vehicles. especially vans, with tools left in them overnight to make sure that they are locked and if possible any valuable property is removed overnight. If you cannot remove the tools then please consider investing in a quality alarm for the vehicle as it could save you money in the long run.

On a more positive note, the local team has begun an active campaign to work with the local residents and schools in order to improve the ever-present issue of inconsiderate and illegal parking at and near the schools during drop-off and pick up

times. It is an ongoing strategy which involves the residents of the affected areas to actively observe and report any inconsiderate parking with photographic evidence. The residents have been briefed on what constitutes a reportable offence as well as what we require by way of evidence. We will then speak to the drivers involved. taking the most appropriate action based on the offence and whether the driver has previously been warned. This has just started but the feedback is that there has been an improvement and we hope this continues. I would like to thank all parties involved, including Four Lanes Schools, as well as all residents for your cooperation and help and to those drivers who think about how their parking affects others.

I would like to make residents aware of the Sherfield Park Youth Hub which runs every Wednesday on a weekly basis. This is available for all ages and runs separate sessions within the evening for different age groups. There are various activities each week put on by the organisers, giving local children a chance to socialise and make new friends in a positive environment. If you are interested, please do not hesitate to come along to one of our Youth Hubs, running every Wednesday during term time. The Mini Hub is designed for children of school years 4-6, begins at 18,15 and ends at 19.15, followed by the Junior Hub, tailored for school years 7-9 ending at 20.30. The session is concluded by Youth Hub which is intended for years 10-12. Many sessions are attended by a local officer from our Neighbourhood Policing team and are therefore a unique opportunity for parents and young people to speak to their local officer should they require assistance or alternatively simply wish to seek advice on a specific issue.

Virgin Fibre Broadband

A recent meeting was held by Virgin Media to update residents in Old Basing and Lychpit on the progress on installing fibre broadband there. It began late last year and digging trenches, installing cables and connecting to properties is expected to finish in late April; then 'go live' mid-May after testing. It's currently 1 of 20 such projects in Southern England's rural and semi-rural areas with a similar number further north; towns and cities aren't included.

The next stage will begin with a similar number until around 90% of non-urban England is connected by 2021, costing around £3 billion. These new areas won't be announced until just before they intend to start work to reduce the possibility of rival firms enticing customers away. How do they decide where to work next? They choose the areas where the greatest number of residents have registered their interest with Virgin – virginmedia.com/cablemystreet. This could of course impact the residents of Chineham, if there is enough interest!

They have 4 packages for houses (50/100/150/200 MBPS) and up to 300 MBPS for businesses and schools, with phone and TV packages shortly afterwards. Their cables will be able to cope with these speeds, unlike BT landline.

County and Borough Councillor Elaine Still

Housing development is alwavs controversial subject it's verv and important to ensure the correct infrastructure is installed to mitigate the effect of increased traffic and people on already stretched services. I continue to keep a close eve and input into proposed developments, particularly those on our doorstep at Redlands and East of Basingstoke.

BDBC has prepared a Draft Development Brief to guide future housing development on these sites, both of which are strategic allocations within the Basingstoke and Deane Adopted Local Plan (2011–2029) and will accommodate approximately 615 homes with associated facilities. The council is currently seeking views on the draft document.

The Development Brief sets out a series of principles that provide detail to guide future development across both sites. The draft Development Brief and guidance on how to respond can be viewed on the borough council's website www.basingstoke.gov.uk/EoBandRSPD. Also, paper copies of all the consultation documents are available for public viewing at the Borough Council's offices. The documents are also available to view in all libraries across the borough during their normal opening hours.

As you read this, we should have more information on the remedial work that we understand will be undertaken on the Black Dam Junction to attempt to reduce the number of accidents that have taken place over the past year since completion. We will now also have to contend with further work on the A33 as I have already mentioned in the Chat and it may be coincident with these projected works; we still await details and will pass them on when we have them.

Planning continues for the housing developments to the east of the A 33 between the Binfields and Taylors Farm roundabouts with the northern most site, Redlands, recently receiving Outline Permission. Work on this site is expected to start at the end of 2017 through to 2019. The A33 road improvements are aimed, in part, to reflect the additional traffic these developments will generate.

We are all aware of the pressure on the NHS currently and I would like to reassure our residents that your three Ward Councillors continue to engage with the Chineham Medical Practice to develop a local strategy to allow more patients to be accommodated as our housing development continues. From a personal point of view, I consider we are most fortunate in Chineham to have such a well structured Practice with the most dedicated and considerate staff who are constantly under pressure despite having over 12,000 residents on their roll.

Minister's Message

We will all remember the shocking death of Labour MP Jo Cox last year and the courageous way in which her family conducted themselves. Nothing can take away the searing loss her family has suffered but it is wonderful to hear positive things starting to emerge from this tragedy. Jo Cox. who personally suffered from loneliness after leaving home for university, had started work on a cross-party campaign to help tackle this issue and it has now had its official launch thanks to colleagues and family members. Research in the UK shows over nine million people say they are "always or often lonely" but most would not talk about it in public. MPs want the report to be a call to action to encourage people to chat and start conversations. The commission is asking people to do more, for example knocking on a door or picking up a phone.

Jo Cox's sister. Kim Leadbeater, said she wanted to continue her sister's legacy "by ridding society of loneliness one conversation at a time". What a fantastic idea and one in which we can all participate. At some time in our lives we will all come across people who are feeling some degree of loneliness. Perhaps we have a friend, neighbour or elderly relative who lives alone. Maybe there's a new mum or dad at the school gate, a new face in the office or a new pupil in your class. Do you know someone who has been recently bereaved or is suffering loss in some way? Is there someone vou know who is often ignored by folk for some reason? People are unlikely to announce they are feeling lonely but by being proactive and starting a conversation. we can all potentially make a difference to people's lives and help to ease their loneliness. Isn't that something special?

Jesus suffered loneliness in his life on earth.

He was rejected and let down by close friends but talked to his father and found the strength and comfort he needed to carry on. He 'started a conversation'! Perhaps we may find ourselves in a state of loneliness at the moment and feel unsure of where to turn. There are some beautiful psalms in the bible that show us that our sorrows are known by God and that he is there for us, wanting to bring comfort especially in our times of trouble. Why not tell him about your situation and see how he answers your prayers?

Our conversations have the power to alleviate loneliness so let's get behind Jo Cox's cause, knock on a door, pick up a phone and get chatting! A great way to honour her memory! Probus Club

Retired RAF Squadron Leader Chris Perkins MVO from Kempshott has traced his old squadron's role in supporting the Allied Forces in their campaign to free Belgium and Holland from German occupation during WW2. Based for many years at RAF Odiham, 33 Squadron operated Supermarine Spitfires in ground attack roles. Chris uncovered details of a battle, vastly overshadowed by the tragic events occurring at that time at Arnhem.

The Battle of the Scheldt estuary was a military operation in northern Belgium and the south western Netherlands in October and November 1944, to secure the port of Antwerp. The First Canadian Army was given the task of clearing the Scheldt area of German occupiers. In addition to Canadian infantry and armoured troops, it included the 1st British Corps, and the 1st Polish Armoured Division. It was joined by American, Belgian, and Dutch units. The flooded, muddy terrain was probably the most difficult battlefield in the war and the well-fortified German defences made the Battle of the Scheldt especially gruelling and bloody. At the end of the five week offensive, the victorious First Canadian Army had taken 41,043 prisoners, but suffered 12.873 casualties (killed, wounded, or missing), 6,367 being Canadians. 33 Squadron at that time was also an international unit and consisted of many volunteer pilots from around the world. Chris and his former colleague located a number of these brave young airmen now resting in remote cemeteries.

Christmas and birthday cards were those mostly sent but soon cards for special occasions such as Valentine's Day (1840), Mother's Day (1872), Easter (1989) and Father's Day (1907) became available. Postcards were also produced from 1869 and their popularity spread as more people went on holiday. It is now possible to buy a card for almost any occasion with the UK industry being worth nearly £2 billion and over 880 million being sold last year. Gina had brought with her a large collection of cards including some very old ones which everyone was able to look at after her talk.

I recently heard on social media that Hampshire County Council (landowners) and Basingstoke and Deane (planning authority), are engaged in preparing plans for a housing development of the area they call "East of Basingstoke", but what is really "East of Chineham".

The East of Basingstoke site has potential for initially 450 dwellings with formal provisions for the travelling community - in the longer term this could be about 900 homes planned. There is no mention of any extra healthcare provision so it seems that there will be an even greater strain on our already overstretched local doctors. Appointments are already taking weeks and this is without Razors Farm having been built. The local infrastructure in terms of the A33 is already dangerous and often back to back towards Reading from 7:20am without thousands more vehicles.

There has been little communication on this from the local councillors and I understand the build is due to start next year once the local plan has been formally adopted. As a local resident I am furious about this and the lack of visibility to residents. What's in a name?

Our last article finished with reference to Pecche Place. That is a rather strange road name, so where did it come from? Before we address that, let us go back a couple of decades to when names for Chineham's new roads were being considered. These days, road names are decided quite early on in the development phase with allocation of-for obvious reasons-the allimportant postcodes. However, 30 years ago development sites progressed for many months with no formal road names and just plot numbers. It was often difficult finding the homes of new residents! Somewhere along the line it was decided that roads should be named after some of the longer-established families in the area. Thus we have names like Hanmore. Cibbons (should have been Gibbons), Mattock, and Maynard. More recently, Froome Place was named after Chineham's oldest resident Olive Froom, but again a spelling mistake occurred.

St Joseph's Crescent was an attempt to immortalize the name of the old wooden church which used to be in Reading Road and which was later replaced by Christ Church on the opposite side. During all this time, developers have had their own ideas about street names and managed to slip in some of their own less imaginative offerings. (like roads named after battleships!). In an attempt to maintain some historic linkages, a then parish councillor, Brian Sperring, made trips to the Hampshire Records Office in Winchester and pored over ancient maps. Most of the road names in North Binfields come from that source. Pecche is thought to be a local landowning family name and may be linked with a one-time London mayor. Interestingly, Fox's Furlong came from a request for suggestions from the public and was chosen from a number put forward.

Whilst some people (including the county council) persist in labeling Reading Road "Old Reading Road", the name has never changed from when it was the A33 and to do so requires the borough council to conduct a poll of residents. As residents of Chineham know only too well, the spelling of our parish presents problems given that the "e" is silent. Some older maps actually show it spelt without the "e". Unlike, say, Hatch Warren, Chineham is a parish in its own right and is not part of Basingstoke town. It is part of Basingstoke and Deane Borough, The Royal Mail has not vet formally declared "Basingstoke" redundant as part of the postal address. However, in these days of postcodes, it is totally superfluous and some residents leave Basingstoke out of their address to emphasise the point. This is quite important in order to help maintain Chineham's distinct identity, particularly when we are treated as just part of the town.

We shall return to this matter, but leave you with an example of where sloppy addressing leads to false information. Take, for instance, Highclere Castle. It is in fact in Hampshire, but because the postal address is "Berkshire", the news media invariably report it as being in that county. Given the celebrity status of Downton Abbey, is it not right that the accolade should rest with Hampshire?
